"Sons & Daughters of Africa in the Civil War: A Cultural Celebration" commemorates the contribution of the African-Americans - Sons/Daughters of Africa - to the United States Civil War. The war lasted from 1861 to 1865.

Grand Rapids has Sister City relations with five cities: Ga District, Ghana, Africa; Omihachiman, Japan; Perugia, Italy; Bielski, Poland and Zapapon, Mexico. Through the Grand Rapids Sister Cities International - Ga Committee, the city maintains ties with the Ga District East and Ga District West Sister Cities in Ghana. Tonight's program also takes note of Ghana's fight for independence that was occuring at the same time as the Civil War.

This program honors — through their descendents — those who fought for the freedom of Africans in this country, and in particular, those who were Michigan and Kent County contributors. Records show that at least thirty men mustered out of Kent County to join the hundreds who made up the 102nd Colored Troops of Michigan and the thousands who came from other parts of the country.
